


St James' West End Magazine March 2022



Vicky writes

It's not fair! It's the phrase my children use more than any other. Mostly it's because they perceive one of their sisters to have a larger piece of cake than them! But they have a real sense of outrage if they don't feel they are being treated the same. They know they are equally loved and special and they expect that to be lived out in how we treat them.



But we live in a world of great inequality and justice issues have been much in the news in recent years; the killing of George Floyd and the Black Lives Matter campaign, the distribution of the covid vaccine, the MeToo movement, Climate Change. As Christians how do we respond to these issues and what is God calling us to do to build a fairer, kinder world?

Through March and April, we are invited to ponder this together, as a church, and with Christians throughout the Church of England. I encourage you to join with us in using the daily 'Embracing Justice' reflections either online (by signing up at the Church of England website) or using the little booklet that's available from the back of church. Please join us if you can for our Lent groups on Thursday evenings in the church from 7.30am to 8.45pm when we will be exploring this theme together. As the pandemic restrictions ease this seems a really helpful Lent theme. What kind of world do we want to shape at this time of transition and change?

This year Lent runs from 2nd March to the 16th April. It's a penitential season so it is often perceived as a challenging time of hairshirt denial but I see it more as a time of change and renewal, to know our need of God and to draw closer to him. As we come out of the dark months of winter it invites us to get into a new rhythm of life, like a collective waking up from hibernation. It offers us a fresh start to get into a healthy and lifegiving routine. The word Lent is from an Old English word meaning spring and as the flowers blossom and the leaves appear again on the trees Lent is a time for spiritual growth as we prepare ourselves to celebrate the joy of Christ's rising from the dead at Easter.

I encourage you to embrace this season and to enjoy it!

We need your help, please!

We are very fortunate that a very small group of members of the congregation work constantly to keep the church clean. There are, however, some jobs that are outside the remit of this valiant crowd and so on March 19th there will be a **Spring Clean** morning.

All ages, including families, are welcome. The more people that help, the quicker and easier it will be for us all! We'll be providing some hearty soup for lunch and do hope you'll be able to stay after the cleaning is finished. Some of the tasks below might seem a little daunting, but there will be lighter duties - a need, for example, to support those that can use a stepladder or making tea and coffee.

A few of the tasks to be tackled:

Removing all the radiator covers and cleaning the hidden elements Cleaning the walls as far as can easily be reached

Cleaning the lower windows

Dusting above the arches and clerestory windows (we have very long poles that will reach from ground level)

Dusting/cleaning/polishing anything else that you have noticed whilst looking around whilst waiting for a service to begin! Sweeping/vacuuming the pews etc. after dust has been dislodged from above.

Livestreamed Services

We have been livestreaming services from St James since July 2020. It has been a steep learning curve using different types of hardware and finding various ways of connecting to the internet and the church sound system. Those of you joining in from home may be interested to see the equipment in church

We have now settled on using Facebook livestream on a dedicated phone via a data only sim card. We have achieved this at a modest cost of £145 for the phone plus an annual fee of £50, i.e. about £3.50 per service for the first year and less than a £1 per service in the



following years, whilst this setup is available from Facebook. The PCC would be delighted to receive any contributions towards this livestream facility.

To date, most of the livestream services have been operated by Donna, with occasional help from Cathy, James and myself. Now that we have developed a fairly simple system, we would love to have other volunteers who attend the 9.30 service to join the Livestream rota. We will show you what to do. It is a 5 minute setup at the start of the service, swivel the camera during communion, then finish and post the service at the end. There is no need to monitor the phone during the service.

Whilst researching which phone would suit our needs best (I tested at least 12), I discovered Phone Clinic in Bitterne, where Abdullah was extremely helpful and let me borrow a couple of phones to test.

A View from the Train Window

I have always loved traveling by train, it's without doubt my favourite mode of transport. Sitting back, watching the world go by, having time to reflect, catch up on a good book, having a coffee, or a drink of something stronger whilst pounding the rails at 100mph is a real pleasure. Plus, as a parent of three children, I have also realised how beneficial a train journey is to relieve the boredom of travelling by car: the children can draw and colour, play games, listen to their own music and, crucially do a wee at 100mph!



Redundancy last year, gave me an opportunity to seek a new career in the railway industry so I was thrilled to start at South Western Railway as Customer Ambassador, based at Southampton Central. There is no doubt that train travel has taken a hit following the Covid-19 pandemic but, things are starting to get back to 'normal' particularly at off-peak time, heralding the return of the "Leisure Traveller." I thought I would take this opportunity to open your minds to the prospect of a day trip on the train and what you might find not far away from home!

We are blessed with so many wonderful places on our doorstep, coast, countryside, even cityscapes towards London can excite me with the travel bug. For this article, I thought I'd single out the New Forest. Just 10 minutes from Southampton Central and you can be lost in peaceful countryside famous for its heathland, native ponies and forest trails. Why not take a train to Brockenhurst, the largest village in the Forest? Adjacent to the station, there are walking trails as well as pubs, cafes, restaurants in the village centre. If you're feeling more



energetic you can even hire a bike at the station to explore the New Forest further. Smaller stations in the New Forest should also get a mention. If you fancy a walk, then starting at Ashurst New Forest, Beaulieu Road or Sway allows you to explore the deeper, rural parts of the Forest either as a circular walk, returning to the same station, or maybe a trail starting at one station, and finishing at another.

If you're longing for some coastal escape, a train trip to Lymington Town (or Lymington Pier for ferry connections to

Yarmouth, Isle of Wight) is a must. Ice cream on the quayside in the summer is well recommended and only a 10-minute walk from the station. Back inland, the small station of Hinton Admiral connects with Highcliffe Castle and Avon Beach. Why not walk along the beach to connect with New Milton? I recently completed this walk with the family – the incentive of ice cream helped motivate the children for the 5-mile hike!



Of course, the New Forest isn't the only place to head to by train. From Southampton Central you can travel further west to Bournemouth, Poole and Weymouth as well as Salisbury, Bath,

Bristol and Cardiff; east to Chichester, Arundel and Brighton and regular trains take you to Winchester and London Waterloo. There is so much to see and explore – let's get back on board!


each year instead of the 9 for the other groups.

Life at St James

Recalling events and activities over the years since 1890, this gives us a fascinating glimpse into what was happening at St James' church set in the context of the world around it. Maybe this will stir some memories of your own. Please do share them at stjameswe.magazine@gmail.com

125 years ago (1897) – Confirmation Classes were to be held in the Church Vestry on Fridays, at 3pm for females, and at 8pm for young men - nice that the ladies could be safely home before dark!

The Church Army Mission Van was due to arrive in the Parish around the 15th of March. During the time it was to be in the village, services and Lantern Lecture would be held in the School Room on weekday evenings. The Officers in charge of the Van 'will be glad to receive offerings of provisions toward their support, and any hospitality it may be in the power of parishioners to offer them.

Something keeps nagging at me about St Paul, Corinthians and tentmakers!

100 years ago (1922) – Keeping politics out of the County Council? Reverend Roland Dawson offered congratulations to Captain P C Pearson who had been successful at the Poll on the 4th March. His opponent, Mr A J L Hill had acted as a true sportsman. Apparently it was a 'clean and honourable contest of two gentlemen ... If only our Parliamentary Elections could be conducted on the same lines how much nicer it would be. Only two or three persons tried to bring the political card into it, but it was crushed at the start. Captain Pearson had no politics in it, nor Mr Hill; and no one but a silly person would try and make the County Council Elections run on political lines. Some of us find we cannot support any of the Political Parties to-day, for they are rotten at the core ... The old Political Parties are worn out, their Shibboleths are as dead as the Dodo; and their vested interest's are a menace to the production of a sane and sensible construction of National Life.' Well that's one person's opinion...

75 years ago (1947) – Foremost in everyone's minds was 'the prolonged cold weather, aggravated in its effects by the painful necessity of reducing power and fuel supplies.' Because of this church attendances had suffered and from a statistical and financial point of view 'this winter has been the most disastrous in the history of the church' according to the Bishop of Winchester. Several churches in the Diocese had had no congregations at all. However, thanks to the loyalty of the St James congregation and the continued and readily given help of Mr Harris and the Choir, both men, boys and girls, 'not one single Choral Service has had to be curtailed.'

50 years ago (1972) – With the Miner's strike coming to an end at the end of February, which resulted in many homes and businesses having to be without electricity for up to nine hours a day, the 'national news was indeed dark and threatening'. Reverend Green however, encouraged people not to be demoralized by what they were reading or listening to in every news bulletin. Instead for Lent he suggested that they spent 'ten minutes less per day reading the news and ten minutes more a day praying about it'.

10 years ago (2012) - Déjà vu? The opening phrase of Reverend Pickett's opening letter was 'It isn't fair' (see Vicky's opening piece). It would seem that justice and compassion were very much on the agenda then as now. Describing unfairness as being inevitable and in some cases unchangeable, he nevertheless spoke of seeking a society that is just and helps those who 'by accident of birth, health, parents, geography or calling ... have been dealt a bad hand'. He also reminded people that only God is just and it is by his 'amazing grace, and undeserved generous love that we live.'

Book Review – The Madness of Grief by The Reverend Richard Coles

Grief. A word defined in the Oxford English Dictionary as "intense sorrow, especially caused by someone's death." This was a word that didn't mean anything to me until my Mum's sudden death in 2018. The turmoil, the upset, the fragility of life and death and the "picking up the pieces" after such a shocking, life changing event that catches your breath and left me feeling totally "lost".

A friend of mine had recommended a book by The Reverend Richard Coles about grief and his recent experiences. You may remember him from the 2017 BBC series of Strictly Come Dancing, various appearances across the BBC TV and Radio and, if you're of a certain age, he was one half of the 1980's duo The Communards alongside Jimmy Somerville who had the number 1 hit in 1986 with "Don't Leave Me This Way".

In 2019, Richard Coles lost his life partner Reverend David Coles unexpectedly. This book "The Madness of Grief" takes us on a very personal journey of how he coped with this moment and the immediate aftermath. His stories, his thoughts, the highs and lows of his grief journey are all part of the context of the book. I found it quietly reassuring some of those certain trivialities of death can bring some light and even some humour

which I could wholeheartedly relate to. He talks of copious amounts of tea and sympathy and how the very nature of these insignificant events can be overwhelmingly generous and kind to someone dealing with such tragedy. It's not just about the tea; it's about coping; adjusting; learning and most importantly finding your way through a wilderness in whatever way he could.

For anyone who has ever lost someone dear to them, I thoroughly recommend taking this personal journey through "The Madness of Grief"



We can pray together and intercede for others, pray on our own and as we walk, write or even sing or dance!

My prayer life changed when I was recommended to read a book with the title, 'Don't just stand there, pray something.' That must have been some 40 years ago! So the list of types of prayers has grown very long and the experience encouraging and illumining. It doesn't matter where we are or what situation we find ourselves in we can do just that, turn out thoughts and actions to pray. It is like a booklet printed in the last few years with the title, 'Try Praying.' It tells us that '27 million adults in the UK pray,' and many more are praying today.

In times of distress, in fearful moments, in joys of celebration we can pray and find it helpful to do so. Booklets and other info on prayer can be found at St James' Church, and Anchor Community Church, West End and across all the Churches of our Churches Together area known as HEWEB.

Perhaps this picture from Albrecht Durer (16th century) created with pen and ink on blue paper that he also created, may help you in the coming days and months. It has helped many thousands of people to pray, to find a quiet time to seek God's presence, read His word in scripture and pray and talk.





Oasis Christian Centre

Oasis is a registered charitable trust committed to providing people and churches with the best of Christian books and products and fairly traded goods and it is where we go for the fairly traded goods that we sell on their behalf at our fund raising events.

Established in 1984 as a resource centre for Christian products and also to sell goods from developing countries. From these small beginnings a thriving charity has developed that supports both local and international needs. Number 25 Church Street was built in 1605 and needed a huge amount of renovation, but as a result of ongoing work it has been lovingly restored and so Romsey has a delightful Tudor bookshop within the historical part of the town, opposite the Abbey.

The book range is extensive, not least the bibles in various versions and bindings, from the major publishers. The children's area is home to a big selection of books for all ages, plus bibles and stories suitable for new babies and christenings. As well as books they sell copious amounts of greeting cards, some unique to them, music on C.D and DVD of all genres, stationery and wholefoods. These wholefoods (dried fruits, coffees, teas, sweets and gorgeous chocolate) are from the Traidcraft and Divine chocolate range. Following a 60 year tradition they continue selling Scout and Guide uniforms as the previous owners of the building were tailors, so they are the only bookshop in the country to supply uniform!

Complimenting the books are gifts from developing countries as well as the UK, as they seek to promote Fairtrade principles and work alongside artisans in their own country. The Leprosy Mission catalogue is often mailed out to help their customers who are looking for something a little different. National book tokens and their own gift vouchers also sold/exchanged.

They are currently raising funds to repair the roof and upper floor windows so are grateful to anyone who has contributed! Buy a book, send a book, read a book and come over and visit them. Monty - the kitten I wished I'd kept

When people find out that I foster cats for Cats Protection the most common things they say are "I couldn't do that" or "it would break my heart to let them go". There have been occasions when my heart does feel sad about saying goodbye to the cat I have helped to rehabilitate or the cat that has lived with me for 3 days or even 3 weeks. I miss the cat that head bumped me hello every time I went into the foster room. I miss the cat with the extra toes! I miss the kitten with the rare markings that had a massive personality for something under a kilo in weight.

But if you work for a large volunteer animal rescue there are always more animals to help. There is a never-ending list of animals waiting to come into our care. Why do people give up their cats? Poverty, moving to a home that doesn't allow animals, bereavement, animals not getting on with other pets or family members. Of course all of this has been made worse by COVID. Many vets were working on emergency only basis and so cats were not being neutered and so more kittens have been born. Now I love kittens. I don't care how disgusting they are. There is a lot of work looking after kittens, but I still adore them.

However, I know that neutering your cat is the very best thing you can do to keep them healthy. Neutered (spayed/fixed/done) cats live longer and healthier lives. In the meantime these unwanted cats need a safe home. They need good quality food, shelter and care from humans. If you have a spare room and some time then you can offer them that. Cats Protection provide all of the resources and all of the training so that you can give each individual cat everything it needs to be happy and healthy. All the while you are caring for the cat there is a team of unpaid volunteers answering enquiries from people wanting to adopt cats and kittens.

Now its also important to remember that a cat is not a dog! Dogs generally like being with other dogs, they are pack animals. They are descended from pack animals. Our domesticated cats are descended from solitary desert cats. Domesticated cats will generally tolerate other

cats and occasionally become bonded with other animals. More that one cat in a house does not make for a happy cat. And that is my answer to why I don't keep each and every foster cat. I already have three cats of my own and they do not want any more roommates. I have fostered and rehomed nearly 20 cats in the last year.

PCC Meeting held on Wednesday 26th January 2022 via Zoom

These are the bullet points from the meeting. A full copy of the minutes can be obtained from the PCC Secretary at pccsecretary.stjameswe@gmail.com

Eighteen Members of the committee were present

- Minutes were agreed
- **Matters Arising** Amendment of sentence Health and Safety policy; report on printed magazines and progress on adverts.
- **Business by Correspondence** Decisions on Mar Thoma, payments to musicians, emergency venue and agreement on a Christmas Craft fair.
- Finances to end of the year were good. Card machines for donations were discussed. Generosity was applauded although some services do still not take collections. Use of funds for improvements was deferred to another meeting. The PCC agreed to an increase in Common Mission Fund by £2K to £55K for 2022, payable by instalments.
- Vicar's Report update on music, choir and services; monthly coffee morning and relaunch of Ignite youth group. Covid measures in church were discussed; agreed to stay as we are. Lent materials for this year will be 'Live Lent: Embracing Justice', pamphlets ordered; quiet day in Lent will be organised.
 - For Queen's Jubilee (2 -5 June) a mini Flower Festival planned with outdoor songs of praise and afternoon tea; St James has been asked to take part in the beacon lighting festivities on Hatch Grange on 2nd June.
- **Director of Music** creation of two posts approved, Organist and Choir Director for traditional services and Music Leader for Church Alive.
- **Building and Fabric** report included update on repairs to organ (still awaiting quotations); delay applying for removal of the front pews until the Covid situation has improved. Since latest repairs no leaks have been detected in either church or hall roofs. Livestreaming is being tested for improvements.
- PCC members reminded to complete short online **safeguarding** Domestic Abuse Awareness training. Lifts to Church discussed but currently too complicated to set up scheme due to insurance, administration and lack of volunteers.
- PCC approved **HOPE** support of both the Cafod 200k Walk against Hunger project and WaterAid UK Jars of Change for Lent.
- **Church Hall Committee** updates on hirings with restrictions to remain in place until after Easter. The church hall magazine advert to be reinstated.
- PCC approved appointment of Caroline Wigley as sidesperson.

Vicky thanked the PCC for their attendance and closed the meeting with the Grace.


Are you good with faces?





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
